There's little doubt we are half way through the year with the recent winter rain and rapid drop in daily temperatures! With the seasonal changes has come the long-awaited release of some restrictions, the welcomed return of parents and volunteers on site, and a renewed energy for learning. Much has happened since our last newsletter, but a few highlights for me:

National Simultaneous Storytime saw our School Captains take on leadership of our site improvement actions in literacy, engaging the whole-school in a shared reading of 'My Family Tree'. With support, they followed up with an 'unpacking' of interpretations of both common and unfamiliar language, and comprehension of the main ideas of the narrative. This peer-peer learning was powerful to watch!

Our teaching staff continued to actively further their skills and expertise through self-reflection, peer observations, and professional collaboration. We held a Pupil Free Day with teaching staff from Riverton PS where we deeply analysed student writing to set goals and plan for their 'next steps'; observed literacy lessons at Kilkenny PS to compare practise and garner new ideas for supporting students to read and write; and are part-way through our own peer observations. These strategies are just a sample of many, that demonstrate our teachers' thirst for new learning, drive for best practice, and desire to be able to provide tailored learning

#### **KISS AND DROP PARKING ZONE**

The trial 'Kiss and Drop' zone outside the JP entrance to our school has certainly helped to keep St Vincent Street clear of congestion. However, to ensure that it makes for a much safer collection point for our littlest learners and enables them to get to and from their vehicles in clear view, please be sure to:

- move up to the <u>top available space and remain in</u> <u>your car</u> - especially during peak collection/dropoff times, this is NOT to be used as a parking zone.
- avoid parking within half a car space from either side of the staff carpark entrance.
- avoid u-turns it is only a short drive 'around the block', and ensures safe traffic flow.

#### WELLBEING DATA

e are buoyed this week by our results from the Y3-6 Wellbeing and Engagement collection where students have self-reported improved ability to regulate their own emotions and persevere with learning, and indicated there were trusted adults at school to whom they can comfortably discuss worries. Over the past 3 years, beginning with learning of traumainformed practice through the Berry Street Education Model, we have worked hard to develop consistent, positive and effective practices to support students' selfregulation, social and emotional wellbeing, and readiness to learn. We are proud of the impact of this work on not only our students' wellbeing and learning achievements, but the overall culture of our school and supporting community. We look forward to unpacking this data further and sharing some areas for collaboration soon.





#### **PARENTS IN PARTNERSHIP - CYBER SAFETY**

As part of the Department for Education's *Digital Strategy,* we have recently gained access to a new reporting system to assist us to monitor student's safe and positive use of digital and online technologies. We are then able to respond in a timely manner to any areas of learning need as part of our classroom programs. 

My favourite place to read is in an oodie. - Blake


I read 'A pony tale' and it was about a horse that got stuck in an old gold mine and got out. - Ken





